

John's enduring memory of RAF Yatesbury is of a collection of almost derelict wartime wooden huts, without heating or hot water, on Salisbury Plain and we were there in mid-winter. The only washing facilities were a row of basins under a lean-to roof. It was the only time I have shaved in cold water whilst wearing a great coat and standing in snow.
